**∧** patient entered detox and short-Aterm who had been here before. He was struggling with his thoughts and emotions, and they were expressing themselves in his behaviors. He was anxious, needed lots of redirection and struggled to follow simple guidelines of the program. His behaviors became so challenging that he was not eligible for the long-term program. But, that didn't deter our staff from working with him.

Over the course of his stay in treatment, his mind and body began to settle, he became calmer and began to follow the program guidelines. His relationship with Jesus began to grow, and finally, he was able to demonstrate consistent enough behaviors that the long-term program reconsidered and chose to accept him into the Grace Program! It was the result of a lot of people working in a lot of different places for this one individual, and we were able to help him get the services he needed.

As with everyone else, we have had to deal with COVID. As the year began, we once again faced challenges with staff and patients getting sick. There was a feeling of "Oh no, not again!" that everyone seemed to initially fight with, but as a team we worked through those thoughts and quickly got back on track. ## YOUR GENEROSITY MAKES A DIFFERENCE.

**D** orn in the suburbs of Pittsburg, Erin **D**was raised in a Christian home by parents who loved the Lord. She grew up in the church, often attending services three days out of the week. As a young teenager, one of the girls in her church youth group introduced Erin to drugs and alcohol. By the time she was in high school, Erin was experimenting with both alcohol and cocaine.

Erin moved away to attend college and quickly joined a sorority known for its party lifestyle. She was able to remain focused during the week, but would party hard on the weekends, doing drugs and selling ecstasy to make money.

Upon graduating with a bachelor's degree in finance and a minor in accounting, Erin decided to go to mortuary school to become a funeral director. Sadly, while completing internship hours in her field, Erin was repeatedly assaulted by her internship supervisor.

Erin felt trapped, believing that if she told someone what was happening, her chances at a career would be ruined. Her life was blanketed with fear and hopelessness. When an unexpected opportunity for employment arose in Baltimore, Erin quickly made her escape. However, even with the change in physical location, Erin could not run from the pain and shame she felt. She turned to heroin for relief.

"I never dealt with what had happened to me. I picked up heroin to deal with the pain and numb it because I needed to keep moving. I got this big job with huge responsibilities and was supposed to be able to manage people. I quickly became a fullblown functional heroin addict, working eight to five, and I did it for 17 years."

As time passed, Erin developed a huge tolerance for the drug. She was financially prospering, and her boyfriend was a major Baltimore area drug dealer. Erin was content in her addiction. It wasn't until she used a bad batch of Russian heroin, a

substance called Krokodil, that her world began to collapse.

Krokodil (pronounced "crocodile") is homemade Desomorphine, a synthetic form of heroin, which is created by mixing codeine with additives like hydrochloric acid, red phosphorus (from matchbook striking surfaces), iodine, gasoline, and even paint thinner.

"I was using it for about three weeks, and it totally destroyed my arms. The Krokodil was eating my flesh from the inside out. It hurt and I didn't understand what was happening, so I kept shooting more into the wounds to get the pain to go away. It got to be so bad that my arms smelled awful and were even gangrene."

Eventually, Erin went to John's Hopkins Hospital to get medical help. Yet, even when faced with a high probability that her arms would need to be amputated, Erin's addiction was so powerful that she left treatment to get high. When she returned, a compassionate orthopedic surgeon saw Erin's deteriorated arms and told her, "The poison is in your bloodstream. I'm not even worried about you keeping your arms anymore. If you leave, you are going to die."

Erin did stay at the hospital long enough to get stabilized, but she was soon out using heroin again and selling methamphetamine to support her drug habit. After a few months, Erin was arrested in a sting and was awaiting trial. Due to a complication in her case, the assigned judge was changed. Her new judge's nephew had gone through the program at PAATC and, in God's kindness, he saw Erin's addiction and sent her to PAATC Women's Home to get help.

"I walked in that door and I met Tori and Saba, and they loved me with Christ's love. That was something I never saw before and His love was powerful enough to make me just sit down and stay there. These people literally loved me back to life!"





Today, Erin serves as a PAATC intern, working with ladies in the program who are battling addiction. She always keeps her sleeves rolled up and smiles as the ladies ask about her "tattoos". She tells them about her scars and uses those opportunities to share the Gospel and proclaim all that Christ has done for her.

As Erin looks to the future she is able to joyfully share, "I used to have beautiful arms. Now because of Jesus I have a testimony and powerful arms."
